Unfortunately, I am unable to source replacements for the existing lighting units from my suppliers as they have been discontinued. However, as per my conversation with Neil he has found a source for both the lamps and ballast which I am then happy to fit.

### Agenda Item 9.1- Cemetery planting proposal

## Four Marks Parish Council - Cemetery Brislands Lane GU34 5AF

Quotation Date: 27<sup>th</sup> September 2021

Project: Four Marks Cemetery, Brislands Lane

Work to be undertaken: Propose planting for an area of the cemetery unusable for graves and to help reduce waterlogging in wet periods

Indicative budget £250

### Site description and brief

The site is approximately 10 metres x 4-5 metres in the north west corner of the cemetery, which is prone to waterlogging in wet periods. The site is under a canopy of mature deciduous trees, so is quite shaded, but is open on the eastern side and gets some sun earlier in the day. The western side of the site consists of a thinly planted hedge that marks the boundary to Brislands Lane.

The brief is to create a modest planting scheme to enhance the look of the area, if possible help address the waterlogging issue and encourage more wildlife. The planting scheme could also be designed to commemorate the platinum jubilee of Queen Elizabeth in 2022, for which the queen has invited citizens to 'Plant a tree for the jubilee', with the aim of creating the Queen's Green Canopy.

### **Outline Proposed planting**

To meet the above requirements at this site within the budget, I would propose a simple planting scheme of an appropriate native tree: common alder (alnus glutinosa), with some underplanting of native plants bugle (ajuga reptens) and/or periwinkle (vinca). Additionally, depending on the size/cost of the alder chosen, English yew could be added to the scheme to create more substantial planting – possibly as a hedge around the alder.

Were additional sources of funding/plants to be available, the planting scheme could be extended to improve the density and mix of the hedge planting along the boundary and to add shrubs – sweet box (sarcococca confusa) and guelder rose (viburnum opulus) around the alder/yew planting.

#### **Fees**

To design and source the plants for the simplest option for the £250 budget, my fee would be £50, so £200 could be spent on plants and soil improver.

Should additional funds be found, my fee for a design and sourcing plants would be £100.

As far as I am concerned, enough is is enough. I am no longer prepared to keep picking up pretty much the same dog mess on a weekly basis considering I don't even own my own dog!

I feel the only option is for me to find something else to do with my time as of next week unless something can be put in place to address this disgusting issue.


I feel let down by the Parish Council personally and on behalf of the football club.







### Agenda Item 9.7 – Letter from Four Marks Football Club

To Whom to May concern,

We, the committee at Four Marks football club have an ambitious plan to get the club into the FA Hampshire league, where we believe we will be able to play a better calibre of football and attract better players to play for the team, thus getting a larger fan base and attracting a larger income.

To achieve the above objectives we will need the following in the coming months & years; Season 1 - 2021/2022

- We will aim to increase the committee member numbers.
- Increase the volunteer numbers to help on match days with the nets/pitch set up & set down.
- Improve training facilities for the players possibly moving the training pitch/goals? We will need somewhere floodlit in the winter.
- Increase the fan base by use of advertising/social media.
- Temporary/Permanent barrier around the playing surface (needed in the Hampshire League)

#### Season 2 - 2022/2023

- Improve the facilities;
  - Permanent barrier around the playing surface (needed in the Hampshire League) – if not installed in 2021/2022 season.
  - o Hard standing on one side
- Possible 2<sup>nd</sup> pitch where the original pitch was for a 2<sup>nd</sup> team/training area or;
- 1 or 2 5 a side pitches for training and to introduce a junior/youth team, we think, with the increase in the size of the village and children from the village on waiting lists at other clubs, it's a good time to introduce a junior team into the village, having done some research on this, we think that it is a viable option going forward.

We would also like to explore the possibility of using the former cricket pitch as the main ground for the club? We have a grant for new goals and I believe you have sanctioned a grant for the dug outs to replace the ones previously removed by the Parish Council—this would be a great way to start "fresh" for the club, and it would be great to have the pitch next to the pavilion/changing rooms for the supporters and free up the old pitch for the exercise of dogs. The Archery Club would still be able to use the facilities on the cricket pitch side of the recreation ground.

I believe with the growing committee, the backroom staff and coaching staff we have in place now and the support from the Parish Council, we could really have something special here in Four Marks. Let's not forget that 2 seasons ago Four Marks didn't have a football team, let alone a team that has this much drive and ambition. Could we set up a meeting to discuss the items in this letter and see if we can find a way forward for this wonderful club and village? On the football clubs centenary year, I hope that this could be the resurgence the village and the club deserve.

### Agenda Item 9.9 - resident communication regarding UAV's

Dear Sir / Madam

After some careful research I believe your UAV policy to be invalid and non enforceable. I would also like to say I'm not sending this email to cause some kind of uprising and a mass gathering of drones to be flown on the recreation ground in protest

However section 236 of the Government act 1972 sets out the procedure for creating bylaws

If a local authority wants to create a rule that restricts or prohibits a certain behavior by certain people, at certain places at certain times this <u>must be done by way of a bylaw</u> if this was to be made enforceable

In the above act section 235 - power of councils to make bylaws for the good rule and government and suppression of nuisances

Any bylaw created in an open space area is subject to scrutiny of the court. This is done is one of two ways....

- A direct challenge by way of a judicial review permitted under section 54 of the civil procedure rules
- A collateral challenge if someone is raising this as a defense as to challenge the validity of the bylaw if being prosecuted under that bylaw in court

When courts consider a challenge to the validity of a bylaw the courts will consider the following

• Is it reasonable

In the case of drones, a blanket ban isn't likely to be considered reasonable. However a ban on certain drones over a certain weight, in certain areas is much more likely to be considered as this is more narrowed in focus

Should the courts find this ban unreasonable this is likely to be considered invalid. Which means the bylaw should no longer be enforceable or it would be successful in the event of prosecution

Also for a bylaw to be valid it has to be consistent with existing legislation. Unfortunately putting a sign up on a wall to say this is banned isn't likely to be enforceable as the bylaw needs to be consistent with existing legislation

If a local authority seeks to deal with a certain type of nuisance it should check existing legislation it should check to see if this has been dealt with already. And in doing so the local authority should check it's bylaws are not going to duplicate or contradict any of the existing legislation

### What legislation deals with drones

From a regulatory standpoint the CAA is the UKs sole regulator for the UK airspace. And the only authority that can implement changes to the structure to the UK airspace. When it comes to lower level airspace over towns / cities the CAA has sort to implement rules to control the safe use of drones. Safety being the CAAs first priority

The legislation for the use of airspace is set out in the <u>air navigation (amendment) order</u> <u>2017</u>. Rules and regulations specific to the use of UAVs are set out in <u>CAP722</u>. Breach of the air navigation order is a criminal offence

If a public body makes a decision that it did not have the authority to make beyond their power this would be considered to be invalid and unenforceable

My suggestion would be for the Parish Council to review the use of drones under 250g in certain areas of the recreation ground at certain times. At the start of this year the CAA put in place new rules reducing the separation distances of drones under 250g. Details of which can be found in CAP2012

While I completely support and understand there are certain areas of the recreation ground not suitable for the use of drones such as the play children areas, sports field at the time of football matches or the tennis and basketball courts. I see no reason why the bottom field would be unsuitable as take off and landing zones if the rules set out in the above documents by the CAA are followed. And provided this doesn't interfere with the use of this space that other clubs have already made a booking for
